School District News

New Superintendent of Schools chosen; will be on board July 1

The District 65 Board of Education has chosen Dr. Lisa Leali, currently Chief Education Officer at Kenilworth School District 38, to be the District's next Superintendent of Schools. She will replace Dr. Jean Sophie, who retires at the end of the current school year.

Dr. Leali's selection was the culmination of several months of community input. The process began with a community survey and parent and community focus groups. This input was then used to create a Superintendent characteristics profile to guide candidate evaluation.

Educational search firm School Exec Connect next conducted an extensive national search, producing more than 50 qualified applicants from diverse geographic and professional backgrounds. An interviewing team of community

While I am sad to see Eric and Lynne go, I am pleased that Mark Dewart has agreed to return to your Board of Trustees to fill Eric's unexpired term. Mark previously served two terms as Trustee and has been instrumental in organizing the work of the 125 Committee. Welcome back, Mark!

Call to service

So much of my letters to you is spent merely presenting the work of the hundreds of volunteers that work to make our Village a treasured community. We are searching for volunteers to help develop our approach to historic preservation, community sustainability, and community services for our senior citizens. The time commitment is minimal, but the benefits for our Village are substantial. If you are interested in serving, Board and Commission applications can be obtained from the Village website (lakebluff.org) or from Village Hall.

Build a better Village

These next few years will not be quiet ones in our Village. The Village's plans are approaching completion for the reconstruction of Green Bay Road and the Robert McClory trail bridge, and the State of Illinois has started their design work of the new Route 41 & 176 interchange.

Over the last year, your Village has been diligently studying the increasing flooding concerns that affect our homes and property. During that time, the State has released new data on storms in our area which predicts that severe events such as the July 2017 flood event are only becoming more common. Our professional engineers have completed their work and identified over \$30 million in improvements that would need to be made for our Village to be resilient to the consequences of our changing climate. Your Board will be carefully weighing these recommendations as we prepare your Village's program of capital improvements for the next two years.

Last words

From time to time, the Village receives petitions for new or redevelopment within the Village. Please know that our examination of development proposals will be careful, thoughtful, and with the long-term health of Lake Bluff in mind. Throughout these times, I know and trust that Bluffers will honor our Village's traditions of spirited participation, debate, and – most importantly – respect for one another. As an active member in regional legislative initiatives, working alongside other chief elected officials for the betterment of our Village and other North Shore communities, I see the value in an involved and well-informed public.

Help keep our Lake clean!

The EPA estimates that over half of pollution in America's waterways is from contaminated stormwater runoff. As water washes over impervious surfaces like pavement, it picks up contaminants and flows down drains into Lake Michigan and the Skokie River.

Antifreeze, detergents, fertilizers, gasoline, household chemicals, motor oil, paints, pesticides, pet waste, solvents, and yard waste all are carried away by stormwater and can hurt our environment.

Consider some of these steps that help keep our waters clean:

- Pick up the poop! Always carry a plastic bag when you walk your dog, and dispose of pet waste in a trash can.
- Avoid oversalting walkways and driveways in the winter, and use non-toxic products whenever possible.
- Store chemicals in leak-proof containers and indoors away from rainwater paths.
- Never pour chemicals, washing water, or pool water down storm drains.
- Redirect downspouts towards grassy areas, trees, and shrubs so that runoff from your roof can soak into the ground.
- Use pervious materials like bricks, pavers, and stones that allow water to slowly filter into the ground.

Water you waiting for?

Some of the Village's oldest water meters were installed in 1975. Gerald Ford was the president and a gallon of gas cost 57 cents. It's been a while. In the same way that most cars built in 1975 aren't on the road today, we want to retire our water meters now that they've lived their useful life.

As part of the Village's efforts to conserve more water, we are replacing (almost) every water meter between now and May 2020. These replacements will eliminate water meters that have lived their useful life and replace them with new water meters that are all-electronic, have no moving parts, and come with modern features that reduce water loss and the costs of operating our water system.

Some fast facts:

- **The Installer.** The Village has hired an experienced plumbing company, United Meters, Inc., to install your new meter. Each licensed plumber has been screened by the Lake Bluff Police Department and will carry identification.
- **The Plan.** United Meters will replace over 2,000 meters in the next four months.
 - Addresses east of Sheridan Road will be scheduled in January and February.
 - Addresses west of Sheridan Road will be scheduled in March and April.
- **What You Need To Do.** You will need to schedule a personal appointment with United Meters. Someone at least 18 years old will have to provide access to your home. You will need to provide clear space around your water meter for us to work.
- **Your Easy Appointment.** Most appointments will take less than half an hour. Your water will be shut off while the meter is replaced. Your new meter is provided at no charge.

Compost on us

Every household in the Village receives **free** take-away composting service. We use your leftovers to create nutritious mulch that helps improve Lake Bluff landscapes and reduces fertilizer runoff. Just place any food scraps at the curb with your landscape waste on trash day. You can use a kraft paper bag or rent a landscape waste cart for \$60 per year.

Include

- Branches, brush, vines
- Fruits and vegetables
- Breads, grains, pasta, cereal
- Non-liquid dairy products
- Eggshells, coffee, tea leaves

Do Not Include

- Man-made materials
(paper, glass, plastic, Styrofoam)
- Liquids, grease, oil
- Meat, poultry, seafood
- Pet litter and waste
- Teabags and coffee filters

Sunrise Park and Beach Update

On January 11, Sunrise Park and Beach experienced significant damage due to a significant storm with high waves. Waves reached 12-18 feet.

Park District staff has started to clean up the north beach and has already hauled away three one-ton trucks of debris. Additionally, staff worked with Lake County Emergency Management staff to obtain 100 sand bags to protect the guard house/bathroom areas in case of future high waves. North Shore Water Reclamation District removed parking lot debris. On Tuesday, January 21, the Park District reopened the north beach with limited access to parking lot and south beach for safety reasons. The North Shore Water Reclamation District and Park District are requesting people follow signs. The Park District has submitted an insurance claim for various areas, but it is unknown whether damages will qualify. There is over \$50,000 in damage as well as specific areas require discussion on next steps.

In 2019, the Park District received a Coastal Engineer Preliminary Assessment and recommendations can be found at lakebluffparks.org. The Board is evaluating all options and will outline a plan for the community by May.

Coastal Engineer Preliminary Damage Assessment and Recommendations:

- South Beach Revetment – The revetment held up but experienced some distress. The stone shifting in areas reveals the design basis. It appears that the stones were set on fabric without a core stone layer. In addition, in most places, the stone armor is one layer thick. There are several locations where stone movements begin to expose some areas of the toe of bluff.

Recommendation: Some restoration makes sense, but nothing needs to be done immediately. Wait out the winter season then perform a detailed inspection and put together a restoration concept. This will likely make sense to include as a modification of the master plan for the South Beach.

- South Beach North end beach – This area was subjected to stress from over-topping waves as well as wave up-rush that flowed from the parking lot and from the revetment over-topping. The erosion was caused by impact by the over-topping waves as well as the outflows of water that escaped to the south on the beach. Most of the damage appears to be sand erosion down to the clay.

Recommendation: It seems this area too should wait out the winter season. It is possible that storms out of the south may push sediment into this area. Reassess this area before the beach season. The likely short-term solution might be sand nourishment to replace the lost sand. A stone solution would be costly and require buttressing of the stone revetments as shown in the

preliminary plan. The exposed steel sheeting top(s) are unsightly and jagged but are at any risk of significant failure in the near term.

- NSWRD Parking Lot – The stone revetment held up. There may be some stone movements but no apparent significant movements.

Recommendation: Reassess in early spring and compare photos from past investigations.

- Central Beach South Cell – Erosion of the small wood crib walls has done some damage – but no damage reaching the bluff. The beach itself is eroded as would be expected for such an event.

Recommendation: While the beach took a major hit, it did fairly well given the stress of a 100 year wind-wave event. While sand nourishment would help the beach – It is best at this point to wait out the rest of winter. High water will continue throughout the season. Beach nourishment may be needed to improve the beach condition before the beach season. It is possible the normal littoral currents will replace some of the lost material.

- Central Beach North Cell – Similar to South Cell.
- Guard House / Restroom building – This structure has taken some wave uprush.

Recommendation: Sandbags would help but from a structural perspective. A stone revetment around the building on the northeast side would make a difference but might be overkill in the long run. Temporary armor stone placement at the building perimeter would help but this approach is costly.

- Dog Beach – Most sand gone. Lots of cobble and concrete debris floated in lake. The bluff is fine. The rubble pile did a good job of protecting the bluff.
- Main bluff – Fine at all locations.
- Pedestrian Access path to the north end – This path is experiencing some damage.

Recommendation: One option is to take some of the larger stone and concrete rubble that has collected nearby and stack it up around the end of that walkway to address the erosion, placing some fabric first.

members, School Board members, administrators, and staff then selected the best candidate.

Dr. Leali completed her doctoral program in Educational Leadership with a Superintendent Endorsement and Licensure from National Louis University. Before this, she earned a Master of Arts in Educational Leadership from Northeastern Illinois University and a Bachelor of Science Degree from Illinois Wesleyan University. Prior to her work in Kenilworth, Dr. Leali served in many administrative as well as teaching positions in Vernon Hills' Hawthorn District 73, including as Assistant Superintendent of Curriculum & Instruction.

"I am so proud to be named the next Superintendent of Schools in Lake Bluff District 65. To be given the opportunity to serve a community that values educational excellence and that nurtures a sense of enthusiasm for life in its students is a tremendous honor," she said. "I am deeply grateful for the confidence the Board of Education has placed in me to lead their school district. My commitment will be to sustain and support improvement efforts which build upon all of the wonderful work that has taken place under the leadership of Dr. Jean Sophie. Her passion and dedication to the Lake Bluff community will have an impact for years to come."

Board President Mark Barry, added, "The Board is so grateful to the community members and staff for their participation in the community survey. Hiring a superintendent is one of the most important jobs for a Board of Education, and partnering with our community was crucial to the process."

Annual Levy update

In December, the District 65 Board of Education approved the 2019 property tax levy request for taxes to be collected in June and September 2020. The total estimated tax extension of roughly \$18 million (including debt service) represents a 2.4% increase over the prior year. **Existing property will see an increase in line with the growth in the consumer price index (CPI) of 1.9%**, with the balance coming from new property.

The District bases the levy on long-term financial projections which include a comprehensive capital spending plan. Increasing revenue to keep pace with inflation enables the District to maintain balanced budgets while addressing ongoing facility needs.

Refinancing or abating debt has led to taxpayer savings of \$4.4 million in past six years

This spring, the Board of Education is seeking to refinance \$2.5 million in debt for an interest savings of \$250,000 over the next eight years. Since 2013, the Board has **refinanced or abated \$25 million in debt**, for a total interest savings to taxpayers of \$4.4 million.

Kellie Bae to become LBES Principal

Kellie Bae, currently Lake Bluff's Director of Curriculum and Middle School Assistant Principal, has been named the new principal at Lake Bluff Elementary School. She takes on her new role July 1, replacing Margaret St. Claire, who retires June 30.

Superintendent Dr. Jean Sophie said that with the District about to go through administrative transitions, "I recommended to the Board of Education that we have a great internal candidate who knows our District, our staff, and our students, and who can keep moving the District forward with the work we have been doing. The Board chose stability, continuity, and a smooth transition and selected a leader who loves kids and is child centered and caring of staff and families."

"Ms. Bae is an excellent communicator," continued Superintendent Sophie. "She is calm, provides steady leadership, and she will be here for a while to guarantee consistency. She has so many gifts to share, and with her passion and commitment to the Lake Bluff Schools, she's the perfect fit for LBES." Sophie said.

Ms. Bae lives in Lake Bluff with her husband Jae, a Cook County Sheriff's Police Investigator, and her son Lincoln, an active three year-old who will attend LBES. "I'm excited about the elementary school setting and the community that I live and work in," she said. "I can't wait to be back at LBES with our PreK-5 students! I am looking forward to seeing things in action each day while working alongside students and teachers. The expectation from the community as far as performance with high achieving students and very involved families is important to me."


The Game Grower program works to increase participation in girls basketball, and works in partnership with the Chicago Bulls.
